# The Future - Revision

### WILL

Will (i.e. will + base form of a verb) is used when we make predictions and say what we think will happen in the future.

It will probaby rain tomorrow.

Cars will use different kinds of energy in the future.

Will is used in speaking when we make sudden decisions.

I can't find my bicycle. I know! I'll take John's instead. We decide something **just before** or **as** we say the words.

Look! It's raining. Oh well, I won't go swimming. I'll go to the movies instead. (I planned to go swimming. Now I decide to go to the movies.)

Will is used when we make promises or offer to do something.

*I'll help* you with your math once I've finished this chapter.

I'll see you again next year.

Your bag looks heavy. I'll carry it for you.

# **GOING TO**

Going to (i.e. be going to + base form of a verb) is used when we have decided to do something.

I'm going to be a doctor when I grow up.

I'm going to visit Francesca next year.

It is also used when we predict something, because of present evidence.

Wow! Look at the time. We're going to be late! Look at the sunshine. It's going to be a lovely day.

### PRESENT CONTINUOUS

The **Present Continuous** is used for things we have arranged in the future.

I'm staying at my friend Laila's house tonight.\* We're staying up all night! Then we're going shopping tomorrow. In the afternoon another friend, Julie is coming over. She's bringing all her fashion magazines for us to look at. (\*Laila and I have already arranged this.)

Going to and the present continuous tense can often be interchanged.

### PRESENT SIMPLE

The **Present Simple** is used to describe events that are part of timetables and programs.

Work starts at 9.

The flight departs at 0900 hours.

Don't be late. The concert begins at 7.pm sharp!

My doctor's appointment is at 12.

# **FUTURE PERFECT**

The **Future Perfect** (will have + past participle) describes something that will be completed at a future time.

I'm enjoying this book. By lunchtime I'll have finished it.

This is my last year at college. By the end of this year I'll have completed my degree.

We moved here about 11 months ago. Next month we'll have been here for a year.

Work on the house is going really well. When you next visit, we'll have moved in.

# **FUTURE CONTINUOUS**

The **Future Continuous** (will + be + active participle) describes something that you think will be in progress in the future at a particular moment, or something that is planned for the future.

I'm hoping to see Chris and Suzy tomorrow. The weather's really good so they'll probably be working on their new house.

I'll be having dinner with my grandparents tomorrow so I'll give them your love.
