

Which is Faster?

Elementary to Pre-Intermediate Weekly

Time: 10 minutes

Level:

Elementary to pre-intermediate.

Language Aims:

To brainstorm vocabulary for a particular topic.

To practice using comparative adjectives and structures to compare two different things.

Preparation

None

Procedure:

- 1. Ask students to work in pairs. Tell them you will say a topic and they need to write down as many examples of that topic as they can on a piece of paper.
- 2. Say the word, "Transport". Students write down as many kinds of transport as they can think of: helicopter, bus, bicycle, plane, donkey.
- 3. Write the word: 'fast' on the board. Ask students to choose any two of the words they wrote down and compare them using the adjective 'fast' on the board. Write the model "A Y is faster than a Z." (i.e. A helicopter is faster than a bus.")
- When students have had time to write a sentence, ask a couple of pairs to read aloud their sentences. Correct pronunciation and intonation if necessary.
- 4. Then write down these adjectives on the board: *comfortable*, *expensive*, *loud*. Repeat the process with students making sentences about other selected items from their transport list.
- 5. Go into the next part of your lesson OR repeat the whole activity with a different topic, for example, 'famous places'. Ask them to make comparisons with adjectives like *expensive*, *noisy*, *big*.

Extra Idea: Adapt this activity to the topic you are looking at. For example, other topics could be Pets, Sports, Foods.

Please note: This warmer would go well before the Elementary lesson, "No-Frills Leader".
